



## Students "Can" Make A Difference in Litter Prevention

The winners of the 2007 No MOre Trash! trash can decorating contest were presented with their prizes in April by representatives of the Missouri departments of Transportation and Conservation. All of the presentations were made at the schools, some of them were made in front of the class and some in front of the entire school. The grand-prize presentation to Livingston Elementary was made during an all-school assembly.

The contest awarded an overall grand prize winner and a first place prize to the winner in each of the three competition categories (K-2, 3-5, 6-8). See page 4 for a complete list of the winning schools and photos of their decorated trash cans. The grand prize winner received \$500 and each category winner received \$100. Entries were judged based on creativity, adherence to contest rules and appropriate theme and logo use.

The contest is sponsored by the Missouri departments of Conservation and Trans-

portation. Kindergarten to eighth-grade students are encouraged to decorate a trash can in a prominent location at their

school and include a litter-prevention message, along with the No MOre Trash! logo.

"This contest was developed to raise awareness about Missouri's litter problem and discourage littering among elementary and middle school students in a fun and creative way," said Arleasha Mays, Missouri Department of Conservation's No MOre Trash! co-coordinator. "All the entries were so unique and original, it was hard to pick the winners."

The trash can decorating contest was launched in 2005 as an annual event through Missouri's No MOre Trash! program, a statewide litter-prevention program.

### Volunteers "Join Hands" to Pick Up Trash

Approximately 1,500 Missouri students turned out for this year's Earth Day Celebration, which was held on the Capitol lawn from 10 a.m.- 2 p.m.

"We always get a big crowd when the weather cooperates," said Roadside Management Supervisor Stacy Armstrong.

MoDOT's booths were a big hit this year! The department gave out 3,000 Norway Spruce seedlings and encouraged the students to plant them to beautify their yards. The students also stopped by to sign the litter pledge and promise to spread the word about NoMore Trash!

MoDOT's Central District also participated in the event with their game, "Pitch In For a

Litter-Free Earth", that challenged students to "pitch" beanbags through a trash board.

"The idea for the game was very creative and the kids loved it," Armstrong said.

The event is sponsored by the Department of Natural Resources to encourage children to take care of the environment and preserve natural resources. A variety of state agencies participate in the event to help educate students and spread awareness about the importance of taking care of the environment.

## SAFETY TIP

### Beware of Ticks!

With tick season upon us, it's a good time to revisit ways to avoid them and the diseases they can cause: Tularemia, Lyme disease and Rocky Mountain spotted fever. According to the National Institute of Occupational Safety & Health, you can reduce the hazards associated with tick-borne diseases by following these safety tips:

- Avoid tick-infested areas, like brush, whenever possible.
- Wear light-colored clothing, long pants

and long sleeves. Tuck your shirt into your pants and your pants cuffs into your socks to keep ticks on the outside of your clothes and off your skin.

- Use insect repellent.
- Check yourself for ticks frequently.
- Remove attached ticks immediately.

*After removing the tick, thoroughly disinfect the bite site and wash your hands with soap and water.*

# Trees for Tomorrow Program Will Provide Millions of Trees For Youth

National Arbor Day, April 27, kicked off the new *Trees for Tomorrow* program sponsored by the Missouri departments of Transportation and Conservation. The program will


provide 2.5 million trees to Missouri youth groups over the next five years. MoDOT will purchase half a million trees a year, and the MDC will distribute them to the youth groups, including the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, FFA and 4-H groups.

The *Trees for Tomorrow* program allows both departments to invest in the beautification of Missouri through the planting of the trees. The trees will be aesthetically pleasing, and will also provide clean air, increase property value and enhance recreation.

"*Trees for Tomorrow* is a great way to get kids involved in protecting our natural resources," Hoskins said. "We're proud to work with MoDOT and kids all over Missouri to get trees planted, improve our environment and enhance the natural beauty of our state."

The Conservation's State Forest Nursery at Licking will provide the more than 60 varieties of the seedlings for the program. Planting instructions will be provided with each seedling to the school children. "MoDOT is responsible for maintaining nearly 400,000 acres of land next to our roadways," said MoDOT Director Pete Rahn. "We sometimes have to cut down trees when building new roads or to keep highways safe. This program will help us replace trees we impact."

The annual investment for the trees will cost \$150,000, which is a lot less than the \$1.5 million it takes to build a mile of two-lane highway in rural areas. MoDOT will also fund MDC's long-standing annual program that provides a tree seedling to every fourth grader in the state.



## TALKIN' TRASH

### No MORE Trash Bash Cleans Up Missouri

Almost 72,000 yellow bags were placed along roadsides across the state as thousands chipped in to clean up litter on roadways during the 2007 No MORE Trash! Bash in April.

Less trash on our roadsides and in our streams and rivers, as well as educating the public about the real cost of litter is the goal of the annual No MORE Trash! Bash, sponsored by MoDOT and the Missouri Department of Conservation. The month-long event encouraged citizens to hold litter pickups and educational programs to raise awareness of Missouri's litter problem.

"We want people to realize we can have a more beautiful litter-free state if people just quit throwing trash out there in the first place," said Stacy Armstrong, one of the MoDOT No MORE Trash! Bash coordinators. "Besides being a lot of work to pick up, it costs Missouri millions of dollars each year – money that could be spent on other things like improving Missouri roads."

Thousands helped clean up trash, including MoDOT crews, Missouri Department of Conser-

vation Stream Team members and other employees, Adopt-A-Highway participants, incarcerated crews and other volunteers.

Many clean up events and activities also took place around the state in April during the Bash, including the 2007 Earth Day Celebration held on the capital lawn in Jefferson City. More than 1,500 people attended the event where MoDOT handed out seedlings, encouraged attendees to sign the litter pledge and hosted games and activities.

"Although this year got off to a slow start because of the record low temperatures in the beginning of April, the activity seems to have picked up later in the month," said Stacy Armstrong, roadside management supervisor. "Many volunteers picked up in March and May as well."

The month-long Bash supports No MORE Trash!, a year-round litter-prevention campaign established by the Missouri departments of Conservation and Transportation. Volunteers who report their activity will be recognized for their efforts with a lapel pin, or other token of appreciation. ■
